From the Desk of Your Pastoral Leaders

“And Jesus said, ‘What do you want me to do for you?’ The blind man said, ‘My teacher, let me see again.’ Mark 10:51

As the days of August soon give way to September and our rhythm of life again changes as kids head back to school and summer comes to a close, I want to invite you to consider what the author of the Gospel of Mark might propose in this transition time. Flip your bibles open to Mark 10:46-52. Go ahead. You have time. It is a short story...

It is the story of the Healing of Blind Bartimaeus. I sat with this story and these questions this morning: What is God up to in this text? What is my vocational call? What is our vocational call as the church?

The first question is about our orientation to God. We as Lutheran Christians always start with God and then move to how God is working in our lives. It is a good practice to help us avoid making God do what we want God to do. In this case, we look at how God works through the life of Jesus just outside the gate in Jericho. Jesus is leaving yet takes time to be with one who not only is outside the temple but outside the city. Jesus abandons all of the rules about cleanliness and the assumptions about who can understand his teachings. He agrees to stop and have a conversation with one on the fringe of society. He shows mercy to one who the rest of society has abandoned. Instead of knowing what the man needs and giving it, he asks

a question: “What do you want me to do for you?” Well, there is a question. The human expression of God presenting an open request that was fulfilled.

So, how might my call as a Lutheran Christian intersect with this story? What is the call in this story for me personally? How do I “dance with God?” Simply put, I am Bartimaeus standing at the gate, waiting for a glimpse of the miracle worker. I have exhausted all other options and out of desperation call out to the one who offers options. I am relentless as I cry out with desperate hope. I refuse to live as a victim. To the depths of my being I know that a different way is possible. I know this because of what I have heard. I have listened to others and know that this Jesus is capable of more. I choose more. I choose to live in the full revelation of the Kingdom of God. I am willing to risk public ridicule to simply be near the one who brings wholeness and life to so many like myself – beggars who live on the fringe. My calling is to dare a relationship with the teacher. My calling is to act publically. My calling is to dare to expect more and to follow the one who gives it. My calling is to leave behind all that which creates bondage – the labels, the expectations, the rules and the low self esteem. My calling is to live my life to the fullest, accepting the healing that is offered, giving glory to God when it is uncomfortable and letting my life serve as a witness and a vehicle for the love of Christ in the world.

I wonder what would have happened if Bartimaeus had called out and Jesus asked the same question, "What do you want me to do for you?" only this time, Bartimaeus is suddenly shy and aware of their social status and simply says, "O, I just wanted to introduce myself and let you know how nice it was to meet you. That's all. Have a good journey." Opportunity lost. Kingdom of God not revealed. Beggar not healed. Witness not shown. Blindness continues. Maybe the asking and the receiving of this story is bigger than first expected.

So, what is our call as the church (that is church with a little "c" which means the whole church – both Walsburg and Olsburg), the 205 churches of the Central States Synod and the 10,000 plus ELCA Lutheran Churches in the United States and the countless Lutheran Churches in the world...plus our brothers and sisters in Christ of other denominations...plus all the people of the world whom God claims as precious creations. Again the original question is, "What is our call, in this story, as the church?" What is God revealing for us and how might we respond?

For me, I think God calls the church to be in relationship with God and all of God's people – no matter how fringe each population might appear. I think God calls the church to cry out in humility for healing and sight. I think that God calls us to receive gifts with grace and generosity to be used for the good of the whole church, not just the ones who seem acceptable. I think God calls the church to follow him, even when it seems humiliating. I think God calls the church to trust that God is bigger than any social issue divisiveness, any label, movement of division, war or economic downturn. In the end, I wonder if God calls the church to expect more than what currently exists – to hope unabashedly for the Kingdom of God to come near – to hope that when the savior shows up all agendas fall away and scandalous grace turns entire kingdoms upside down. I think God calls the church to hope.

It has been an exciting morning with this text. I hope each and every morning that you are able to spend dwelling in the living Word is

rich and lively. With just three questions, the Spirit stirred my heart in ways that I never expected this morning. I already see things differently than before.

May the peace that passes all understanding keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Olsburg Council Highlights

The Olsburg Lutheran Church Council met on Wednesday, July 15, 2009.

Members present: Laura Clifton, Jim Nelson, Pastor Gordy Sandquist, Joyce Cantrell, Jan Cooper, Kristi Fronce, and Mike Apley.

We opened the meeting with prayer.

Reports:

Secretary's report: Joyce moved to approve the report. Laura seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer's report: The council members discussed the 4 different reports provided by Laura. Mike thought that statistical process control might be a neat addition for the months over the years. Laura offered for Mike to do it. Mike decided it wasn't that good of an idea. Joyce moved and Mike seconded that the report be accepted. Motion carried.

Pastor's report: Sonja is in the process of being accepted for candidacy as a diaconal pastor. To explain the 3 rostered designations in the Lutheran Church, the associate in ministry is word and service in the congregation. Diaconal ministry is word and service in the world. Ordained ministry is word and sacrament. Sonja will be pursuing a masters degree in this program. The congregation will have some paperwork to do and there will be a \$50 congregational fee.

This last week the 4 soon to be 9th grade confirmands traveled to Kansas City and stayed at Hollis. The students traveled into Kansas City to purchase. Douglas Apley is interested in serving as a youth representative on the Synod Council after he is confirmed. The students used a talking pyramid to address some of the church and social issues they addressed.

About 3 months ago Pastor Gordy passed out the information on the Church vote on the human sexuality statement. All 4 resolutions were memorialized to pass on to the Church convention (they were endorsed to pass on). Pastor read the 4 resolutions to the council. There are 275 congregations in the Kansas-Missouri Synod. Approximately 2/3 voted to memorialize these resolutions. The Council read different passages from Deuteronomy to study and discuss the concept of Old Testament laws in today's society.

The partnership for missional church, which was voted on by the Olsburg Council to be participated in, has been tabled by Walsburg for

the time being. The Synod has indicated that the Walsburg portion of the fees may not be an issue.

Propane Central will be doing safety checks on our tanks this coming week.

Committee reports:

Property: Kirby was unable to attend. It was noted, he crawled up in the attic on Sunday and spotted several wet spots in the attic that have not been showing up down below yet. Kirby has previously seen where hail has knocked holes in the roof. We'll ask Kirby where to start with people who repair or replace slate roofs.

Old Business

Wood floors are still on the agenda.

PA system: Glenn's music will come up to look when they get through the students getting ready for school.

Parsonage fund committee: Mike, Julie Munson, Diane Nelson, and Pastor Gordy. They will meet after Church to discuss the funds and immediate status.

Annual performance review: Gordy will be starting his clinical pastoral education and will be needing to develop a group of 6-8 people over the CPE period. There will be evaluation during this period. Then, Gordy will start his formal internship, during which there will be additional formal evaluation. His anniversary with the congregation was July 1. So, getting a group together to communicate with Gordy and Sonja would be appropriate at this time or in the near future. Mike moved that we have a formal review at the next council meeting, Joyce seconded the motion, the motion passed.

Constitution update: Still pending

Contemporary worship: Tabled for the time being to be picked up again at the appropriate time.

National youth gathering: Everything on track to leave next Tuesday.

Church Directory: Gordy is working on this. This should be able to be completed by Christmas.

New Business

We need to work as a congregation to evaluate needs within this community.

Cemetery: Joyce has started a letter. It would cost us about \$50 to do a one page bulk mailing. We could also put it in the church newsletter. Joyce also proposed to sit down with people in the community to identify people with family buried in the cemetery.

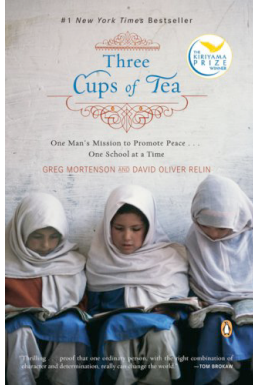
Jim brought up that the next bill will zero out the cemetery fund with summer mowing. Jan moved and Mike seconded moving \$900 from the general fund to the Olsburg Cemetery fund to finance the remainder of 2009 maintenance.

The trees in Mariadahl cemetery that were sprayed are dead and need to be cut down and removed. Jan said that they would just go ahead and take them out. Gordy brought up that it is time to discuss the raising of plot fees to finance maintenance of the Olsburg Cemetery. A figure of \$300 - \$500 was discussed. Church members are currently free and non-members are \$100.

The front door needs sealed before they sustain permanent damage. Lee Cantrell and Joe Erickson did it last time. Jim will ask Lee.

The meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.

codes of business, power hierarchies and imbedded rules of faith life), this one person made profound differences in the lives of countless children, numerous villages, several regions and the governments of three very different countries. It is reminiscent of the challenges that Esther faced as she quietly worked to help save her people from a government generated death warrant. Greg Mortenson, like Esther, doesn’t use his faith as a tool or false identity, but rather lives out of the values he acquired as the son of missionary teachers in Africa, born of Lutheran stock in Minnesota. He intuitively acts as a disciple and respects the faith paradigms of the people he encounters in Pakistan, earning him the ability to gather resources together and genuinely help people, not for his own gain, but for the good of humankind. Enjoy this read – it is nothing short of inspiring.

Back cover:

In 1993 a mountaineer named Greg Mortenson drifted into an impoverished Pakistan village in the Karakoram Mountains after a failed attempt to climb K2. Moved by the inhabitant’s kindness, he promised to return and build a school. ‘Three Cups of Tea’ is the story of that promise and its extraordinary outcome. Over the next decade Mortenson built not just one but fifty-five schools – especially for girls – in the forbidding terrain that gave birth to the Taliban. His story is at once a reverting adventure and a testament to the power of the humanitarian spirit.

Here (in Pakistan and Afghanistan), we drink three cups of tea to do business; the first you are a stranger, the second you become a friend, and the third, you join our family, and for our family we are prepared to do anything – even die.’

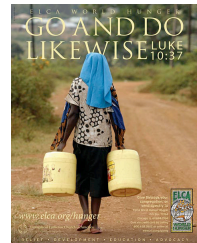

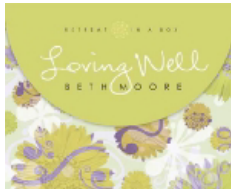

Women's Bible Study Groups

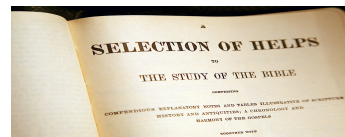

Consider meeting with a small group of women, 11 times (one – two times each month) between October and April using the Beth Moore series, "A Woman's Heart: God's Dwelling Place." Within each group of 8-10 women, a leader will be chosen to facilitate using the videos provided. From the back cover: *Lead women to discover the joy of dwelling in God's presence. Perhaps no Old Testament event so dramatically illustrates God's persistent desire to relate to his children as the building of the tabernacle in the wilderness. Through the tabernacle God initiated a deeper relationship with God's chosen people by bringing reconciliation and revealing God's glory. And certainly, no Old Testament event so richly prefigures the coming of the true tabernacle, Jesus Christ.*

Beth Moore invites women to enter the sanctuary and let God reveal marvelous mysteries to them.
