### **THANK YOU**

I haven't started writing thank-you letters for all that was given in honor and recognition of my Ordination this past week. It may take a couple weeks, and until then – we are moving forward with mission and ministry as we lean into a new school year. So, what might the year ahead have in store for us?

More and more studies are showing that mainline churches have not been doing a very good job at discipleship. In light of this, there has been much work and thought about what specifically entails "discipleship." Discipleship in simple terms has come to be described as practices of faith that help us respond to God's promise in our day to day lives.

So what have many congregations adopted as a measure for these practices of faith called Discipleship?

- † Worship Regularly
- † Learn Thankfully
- † Pray Continuously
- † Give Generously
- † Serve Lovingly

You could probably come up with many more actions verbs and adverbs to describe these different practices of discipleship, but these five have long been considered an exceptional foundation as individuals and communities move forward in mission and ministry.

## **Adult Bible Study**

This fall I have chosen study that looks at eight of the core stories in scripture that will help us grasp the heart of the Bible's witness and see our own life experiences in light of God's saving activity. Some reading will be expected before each weeks study, but you will have two weeks to do your pre-work.

If we believe that Jesus changes lives AND each of us continue to grow in our faith, -- What would fully formed Christian faith (and Disciples of that faith) look like in this place three years from now?

#### **Discover what the needs in the community are...**

This is a process that entails a more clear understanding and adoption of congregational vision and guiding principles. Both council have agreed to a day long retreat together with leadership and anyone else who is interested (**everyone is welcome**). We will open the day with short overview, and then focus on the 2, 10, & 16 chapter of the book of Acts.

We will discover 1) What did God do in the chapter you studied? 2) What did people of faith do in the chapter? 3) What key lessons would you say any church should learn/remember from this chapter? – We will do this in small groups so there will be plenty of activity.

This will be followed by a guided prayer time around the beginnings of developing a "purpose" statement (God's purpose for our church is...)

During the afternoon we will work intentionally on developing (each congregation individually) guiding

principles (using the Acts text as a form (ation) and outline of what these look like).

**We will begin promptly at 8:30, and be finished by 3:00 PM.** This includes a lunch break.

After a day like this, we will be able to more fully emphasize the guiding principles of each congregation as we move more fully into action and mission. The hope is that each congregations "guiding principles would be adopted as a "continuing resolution" at the next annual congregational meeting.

#### **Missional Engagement Team**

Walter Brueggemann writes that "Mission is where our greatest gift meets the world's greatest need."

...But how do we know what to do? As a follow-up to the **Leadership Event**, interested members will invited (from both churches) into this process of discerning what God is calling the church to be and do. During our monthly gatherings we will engage material from Pat Keifert's "We are Here Now" that will lead us along in the process of Dwelling in the Word; listening to the community; wondering; and then experimenting with small pieces of ministry. The final step, even in what might seem a failed effort, is to learn from the experience. The process is called the "innovation of diffusion." It is not linear like a strategic planning but rather faithful to the Word and open to the Spirit's nudgings. It places great faith in the gathered community who serves as the hands and feet of Christ in this world, here and now. It is pretty exciting stuff.

## A Life of Joy

*The story that follows is an occasion in the ministry of Rev. John Schreiber in which a woman's pledge was beyond anything her pastor thought she could afford. She not only gives generously, but demonstrates that doing so can be a source of joy. (From Salt Seasonings, used by permission.)*

The Rev. John Schreiber, Bishop of the Southeast Michigan Synod, tells a story about a visit to a parishioner he made while he was a young pastor. It was one of those stewardship campaign calls in which he knew, at some point that he was going to have to ask for her coming year pledge. He dreaded that moment, because this woman was a single mother on a very low income – poverty level. She struggled to get by, he knew, but the church council had agreed to an "every member visit" and this woman was on his list.

On the day of the visit, Schreiber found himself sitting at her kitchen table, making small talk and generally avoiding the subject of why he was there. Finally, she got to the point, saying something like, "I suppose you want my pledge." He stammered that he'd been hesitant to ask, knowing her circumstances.

With her pledge card lying on the table between them, she laid her faith on the line: "I want to pledge \$30 a week." Schreiber was dumbfounded, saying "I know how much you make – you can't afford that!"

That's when the loud and clear lesson came through as the woman replied, "It's the least I can do. Jesus gave everything and all for me. Write it down."

It's easy to imagine a broad smile on her face at that moment. The comfort and happiness would light up the room. Think about the emotions flowing through her as she made that sizeable financial commitment.

That woman, who had little in the way of material comforts, who just managed to get by and eked out a hand-to-mouth existence, pledged \$30 a week to her church. And she did it with confidence and no small amount of joy. She had been blessed, and she knew it.

Maybe it starts with Luke 21:1-4 (CEV): *"Jesus looked up and saw some rich people tossing their gifts into the offering box. He also saw a poor widow putting in two pennies. And he said, 'I tell you that this poor woman has put in more than all the others. Everyone else gave what they didn't need. But she is very poor and gave everything she had.'"*

Maybe that's just it, she knew she gave from what she had, or what she had first been given. The woman John Schreiber visited that day modeled the life of a steward. That's a strong lesson she teaches us.

- We don't give because we're pretty well off and won't miss a few bucks.
- We don't give because we somehow feel obligated.

We don't give because we owe "dues to the church."

Sometimes we get so caught up in our giving that we forget why we're giving. We forget about our joyful response. The women in the Luke 21 story and in Pastor Schreiber's congregation knew exactly what their reasons were. Do we?

When we give from what we have - and with an awareness of all the blessings we have - that's when we truly become joyful. That's when we become true stewards. God leads us there. As the psalmist writes in Psalm 16:11: "You show me the path of life; in your presence there is fullness of joy, in your right hand are pleasures forevermore." There is a fullness of joy just from being in God's presence, and that joy shows up



where we least expect it.

We give in joyful response and often it's a joy we haven't known before. After all, it's the least we can do.

- Where is the joy in your stewardship journey?
- Take a piece of paper and write a short paragraph that describes the kind of joy you think the woman from Pastor Schreiber's congregation felt. How is it similar to the joy you feel when you give to your congregation? How is it different?
- What percentage of her income do you think the woman from Pastor Schreiber's congregation was giving? If you gave that percentage, how do you think you would feel about the income you'd be giving away?

If someone was telling a joyful story about you and your stewardship, what would it be?

# *Run To Live On*



**What : 5K Run and 1 Mile Fun Run to raise money for Alzheimer's**

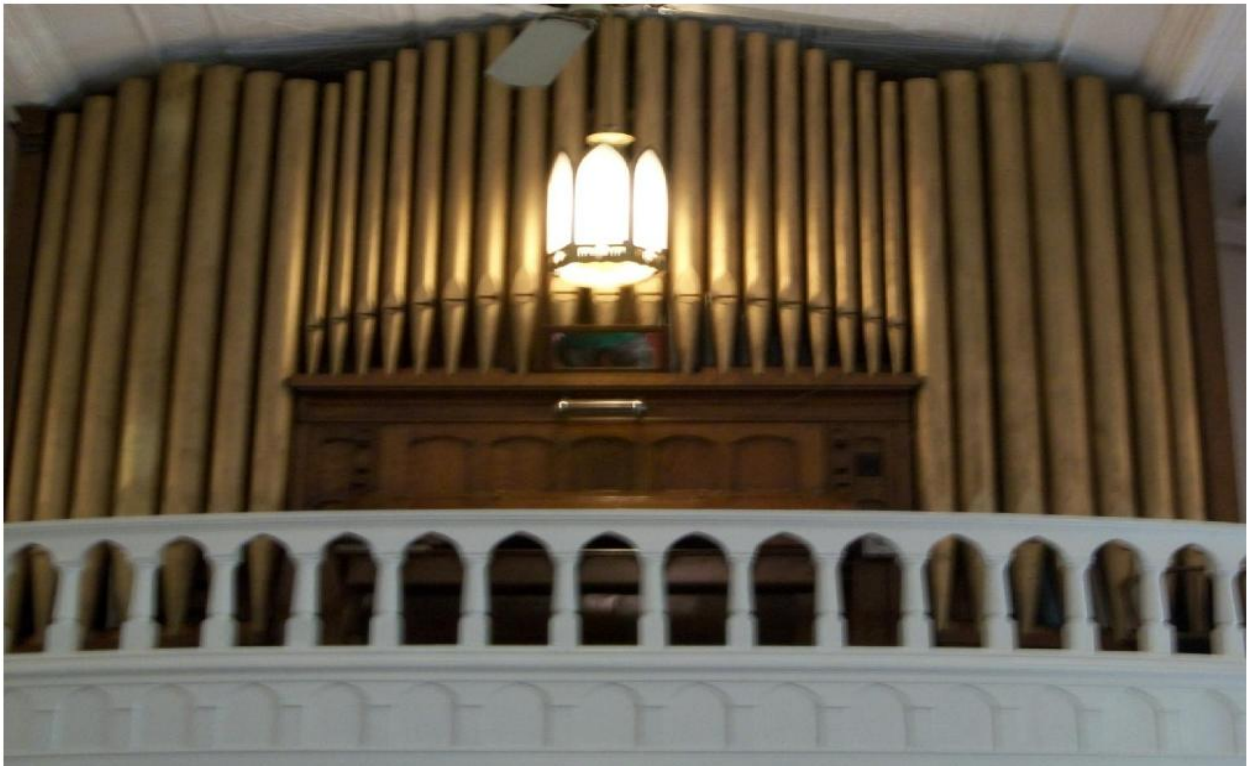
