Reflections on Sexuality and Certainty

It is sad to see a relationship spiral out of control. We have witnessed family or friends embroiled in conflict as hurt and pain feeds on itself until a relationship is destroyed. We have been there ourselves-wanting to hurt another as badly as we feel we have been

hurt-as a teenager when parents fail to understand, as a spouse deeply betrayed, as a parent when helplessness turns fear and disappointment into rage.

As I write this, the church I serve is in turmoil. After having struggled with the issue of sexuality for decades our church in assembly has decided gays and lesbians in committed monogamous relationships may serve as pastors in our church. Some see this as a moment of grace as our church welcomes all people as they are, as Jesus did. Others see this as a betrayal of two thousand years of Christian tradition and in direct opposition to the Bible.

I am troubled by the certainty of both sides. For a church like ours, whose theology is Biblically based scripture is foundational. On the other hand words translated as 'homosexual' have a range of meaning in Hebrew and Greek, none of which is 'consenting intimacy between committed adults.'

While deeply troubling, conflict in the church is neither new, nor surprising. The Biblical book of Acts recounts the turmoil that ensued when the early church struggled with the issue of circumcision and whether it was necessary for people of faith. The

only scripture they had at the time clearly indicated it was necessary yet the church ultimately decided it was not.

One hundred sixty years ago churches of many denominations split over the issue of slavery. Those who supported slavery had the strongest Biblical support. There are a wealth of Bible verses assuring them they were right. "Slaves, obey your earthly masters with fear and trembling..." was a favorite. Of course these verses were ripped out of context, as are verses in support or opposition to our church's current decision.

At one point in our church history those who were divorced were prohibited from serving as pastors or church leaders because Jesus clearly taught that divorce was not God's will. While no one in their right mind would contend divorce is a good thing, most would agree that it is, sadly, sometimes a necessary thing-and that God's final word is a word of forgiveness and grace, not condemnation.

Forty years ago our church was in turmoil over the issue of whether women could serve the church as pastors. Then, too, there was scriptural support for those in support and those in opposition.

There are two constants in issues dividing the church over the centuries: absolute conviction and a reliance on scripture to support this conviction.

Each person must prayerfully discern the meaning of scripture, not only about controversial issues but in our daily faith walk: where am I the prodigal? the self righteous older brother? Where am I called to be the forgiving parent? I cannot definitively tell you God's final word. I can caution you against those who do.

The Bible tells us those who were certain of God's will, and harbored no doubt of what God would have them do, stoned the

prophets and crucified Jesus. In contrast, those heeding God's call wrestled with doubt: Abraham, Moses, Jeremiah, Job, Thomas, Mary, Martha, Peter all experienced doubt and despair as they lived as God's faithful people. Even Jesus himself cried out on the cross, "My God, why have you forsaken me?"

The conclusion is inescapable for Bible believing Christians. The more certain you are right, the more likely it is that you are wrong. This is a troubling notion.

It is even more troubling if we take it out of the realm of theological disagreements and put it where it belongs: in our own troubled relationships; as a troubled teen, a betrayed spouse, a disappointed parent. Our hurt blinds us to our own part in the failed relationship. Our conviction makes us deaf to appeals for understanding.

It is always easier to see the sins of another than our own. More convenient too, since it does not require anything of us.

I am not certain if my position on ordination of gays and lesbians is correct. I pray that it is. I do know that both I, and you, dear reader, are mistaken when we think the problem in our troubled relationship lies solely with our spouse, our parent, our sibling, our boss, or our neighbor.

May God grace our certainty with doubt, for doubt opens the door to God's Spirit working in and through our lives and relationships, bringing hope and healing to our church and to our own troubled lives.

The Olsburg Lutheran Church Council met on Wednesday, August 19, 2009.

Members present: Laura Clifton, Jim Nelson, Pastor Gordan Sandquist, Sonja Sandquist, Joyce Cantrell, Kristi Fronce, Kirby Burklund and Willis Poppe. Mike Apley joined the meeting late.

We opened the meeting with prayer. Sonja led the group in a Bible reading.

Reports

Secretary's report: Joyce moved to approve the report. Kirby seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer's report: Kirby moved to approve the report. Kristi seconded. Motion carried.

Pastor's report: Pastor Gordy started Clinical Pastoral Education today. The class is held in Salina. It provides guidance on skills needed for hospital visits. He will attend the class on Wednesday's.

The council discussed the vote to be held this week at the ELCA convention on the Human Sexuality Statement. Anyone can watch the vote by accessing the ELCA web site. There will be a live stream into the meetings both Thursday and Friday. Pastor asked that we be thinking about what we would like to do for Thanksgiving services. Do we want to try something different?

There is a large rock pile outside the church. It's been there for a long time and probably needs to be moved. After looking at the rocks, the council discussed the possibility of making a prayer garden. A goal was set to have something done with the rocks by Arbor Day - April 30, 2010.

Pastor Gordy has scheduled a "Staff Appreciation Day" for Sunday, September 20th following church services. A reception will be held to honor our church staff.

Committee Reports

Cemetery: Joyce is creating a list of names to be sent letters asking for donations to the Olsburg cemetery fund. This list will consist of family members of those buried at the cemetery.

Property: Kirby has found someone to work on the church roof. He will have more information at the next meeting. He has also contacted someone about the PA system. They will be coming to the church in September to look at the system.

Vacant Council Position: There are two individuals who expressed an interest in filling the vacant position.

Front Doors of the Church: The doors need to be sanded and oiled. Jim said he would help do the work.

Nativity Scene: The council discussed whether or not we should purchase a new nativity scene for the church. We will look at possible options and report our findings at the next meeting.

New Business

Cabinets for Sunday School: The Sunday School is in need of some additional space for supplies. Kristi asked if we could inventory the old cabinet in the corner of the basement to make room for supplies. There may still be a need for additional space since the old cabinet is not deep. The council agreed there are probably several things in the older cabinet that can be thrown away. The Sunday School teachers will look through the cabinets and report back to the council.

Christopher Williams Concert: Jan reported there will be a concert in Manhattan on October 17th and 18th.

Confirmation: Confirmation for Douglas Apley, Shane Adams, Mikayla Vargo and Madison Vargo will be held on October 25, 2009. It was mentioned we need to get the confirmation pictures for those years that are missing and we need to designate someone to take a group picture for this year. Also, a reception in honor of the confirmands is being organized.

Elections: Kristi, Jan and Jim are the council members whose terms will be ending. They will be on the committee to create the ballot. They will need to meet soon to prepare for the October election.

In closing, Pastor Gordy stated he would announce the results of the vote from the ELCA meeting during church next Sunday. We may have a meeting in the next couple of weeks to discuss the results of the vote.

The meeting adjourned with The Lord's Prayer.

Women's Small Groups "A Woman's Heart – God's Dwelling Place"

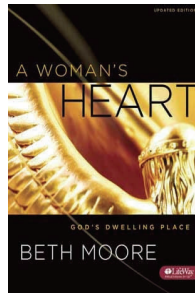

Consider meeting with a small group of women, 11 times (one – two times each month) between October and April using the Beth Moore series, "A Woman's Heart: God's Dwelling Place." Within each group of 8-10 women, a leader will be chosen to facilitate using the videos provided. From the back cover: *Lead women to discover the joy of dwelling in God's presence. Perhaps no Old Testament event so dramatically illustrates God's persistent desire to relate to his children as the building of the tabernacle in the wilderness. Through the tabernacle God initiated a deeper relationship with God's chosen people by bringing reconciliation and revealing God's glory. And certainly, no Old Testament event so richly prefigures the coming of the true tabernacle, Jesus Christ.*

Beth Moore invites women to enter the sanctuary and let God reveal marvelous mysteries to them. This in-depth, biblical study explores the fascinating account of the building of the tabernacle, the significance of its intricate design, its pivotal role in God's work, the grand fulfillment of God's purpose through Jesus Christ, and its variety of meanings for their walk with God today. Women will be challenged to prepare their hearts, like the holy of holies, to become a home for God's love and glory – a dwelling place for the Most High God.

Christ has claimed us in baptism and nourishes us in the communion of his body and blood. He leads us to the new Jerusalem. There we shall join all the saints in praise of God, who has turned our graves into the doorway to eternal life. ("Sundays and Seasons", p. 302)
