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From the Desk of Pastor Keith

This month is the 500th anniversary of the start of the Protestant Reformation. The Reformation had far-reaching impact not only on the church, but on culture, music, literature, education, government. It changed the course of history.

There is much we can learn from the Reformation. Certainly, we can learn that we need on-going reformation. We are not perfect and our institutions are not perfect. We need to continually seek how we can re-form, re-new, change so that we can more adequately be what God desires. This is not change for the sake of change. It is being faithful to the God who has made us and claimed us and called us to be servants like Jesus.

To be sure, the Reformation is about change - but not just any change. Its about the Gospel and the change that happens when the Gospel goes to work in the lives of people. It is about the Good News of how Jesus Christ changes people, people like you and me. It is about the Good News of how Jesus Christ changes the values, the spirit, the world-views, the culture, the laws, the institutions, the hopes and dreams of people. It is about the Good News of how Jesus Christ changes the world!

Yes, we have a ways to go. We have not yet arrived. So let's

continue the work of reformation. May the Reformation of five hundred years ago inspire us to be bold and courageous in the work of reformation today.

Both Olsburg and Walsburg are observing the Reformation on Sunday, October 29, with special celebrations. Watch the Sunday bulletins for information about the specifics. Be sure to attend what you can. Let's celebrate! But even more, let's be committed to the on-going work of reformation!

Five Hundred Years

Five hundred years ago Martin Luther kicked off the Reformation. He didn't intend to become famous or to divide the church, yet he changed the world, helping to usher in the modern era. Luther's preaching and teaching brought him into conflict with the church and the government, the Holy Roman Empire. This courageous stand by one man sparked a century of conflict. It started as a war of words, but eventually spiraled into actual war, changing Europe and Christianity forever. and contributing to the birth of our modern world.

Luther was born in 1483 in what is now central Germany. His parents tried to give him a good education and hoped he would become a lawyer. Instead, when he was twenty-one he became a monk. He set out to become an A+ monk,

doing everything he could to please God, but was tormented by the sense that he could never be good enough.

In time he became incensed by the church saying, in effect, that if people purchased a certain document - an indulgence - it would provide God's forgiveness for their (or a loved one's) sins. When he began questioning this teaching, a fierce controversy began over the church's teachings on forgiveness, grace, and faith. Luther was eventually excommunicated from the church and outlawed by civil authorities, but his witness of God's forgiving mercy in Christ found many supporters.

Five hundred years ago this month, on October 31, 1517, Luther sent a letter to the Catholic archbishop of Mainz that urged renewed preaching of "the gospel and the love of Christ" instead of continued promotion of indulgences, which had "silenced" gospel preaching. He did not choose the day at random. Church representatives were actively marketing indulgences because the next day, November 1, was All Saints Day, a day when most people came to church. He enclosed a copy of his 95 theses, which were also posted on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg that same day.

Why is this important to us today? All of us continue to live in a culture where judgment, guilt, and shame are everyday experiences and where bullying words, abusive actions, and disgraceful discourse permeate our public and private lives. The indulgences controversy may be a relic of the past, but the healing and reconciling message of God's mercy and forgiveness in Christ that Luther and others proclaimed is still needed, and still surprisingly contested.

Luther wrote many influential books, most of which are still valued today. He created the Small Catechism to guide ordinary people in learning about God. He wrote hymns such

as "A mighty fortress is our God." He translated the Bible into the German language so that many people could read the word of God. He was a passionate and remarkable man, totally committed to helping everyone know the grace of God which comes to us through Jesus Christ.

While the Reformation began in Germany it quickly spread throughout Europe. Today the Lutheran family can be found in more than 100 countries, incorporating many languages, cultures, and histories; yet all share a faith identity rooted in the Reformation witness to the Gospel message of justification by God's grace through faith in Jesus Christ.

WHERE DOES MY OFFERING GO?



ELCA members in more than 9,300 congregations in the United States and Caribbean give approximately \$1.75 billion in regular offering to support ELCA ministries in their local communities and worldwide. When members give through their congregations, a percentage of that money is then shared with the local synod and the national churchwide organization.

This unrestricted giving, called Mission Support, gives us both the foundation and the fuel to do God's work in the world and a portion of the gifts circle back to support ministries in synods and local congregations. Of these unrestricted gifts, the churchwide organization receives around 2.6 percent. This represents the largest portion of the ELCA churchwide organization's operating budget.


