From the Desk of Your Pastoral Leaders

For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.

Romans 3:28

Theological precision matters. How we understand God and how God is revealed in Scripture matters. This is very much what committed Martin Luther to the cause that eventually enveloped his entire life. It is the reason we have celebrated Reformation Sunday every year for the last 500 plus years. The lens that we put in front of Scripture helps how we understand the living Word that is revealed in Scripture. Theological precision matters.

Let me give you an example. In April 20th of 1999, 15 people from my congregation were inside Columbine High School when the shooting rampage began, leaving one of my youth paralyzed and 13 people, (none from our congregation) dead. The shooting happened during the day yet because there was fear that bombs were still active in the school, the authorities couldn't get to the people who may have still been alive on the floor but unable to move. They couldn't get into the schools for hours. The families waited through the night at the nearby elementary school. They were waiting to hear if their sons and daughters were dead or alive. In this situation, what you believe about God and how you believe in God's grace matters a great deal. What you say in these moments can make or break the faith life of one of God's beautiful children. How do you make God make sense in a situation that is

so confusing? In these situations of tragedy the living Word is incredibly powerful. I invite you to consider carefully how you engage your spoken words. Our witness, or God talk, in these situations is almost always remembered in both good and bad ways.

All ELCA seminary students, Associates in Ministries. Diaconal Ministers and Parish Ministry Associates become intimately familiar with a little book that sheds light on one of the most important theological principles of the Lutheran faith justification. It is a book by Gerhard Forde called, "Where God Meets Man: Luther's Down to Earth approach to the Gospel." In simple terms, Forde helps the reader identify and align with a theology of the cross versus a theology of glory. He starts with the principle, "God comes down." That sounds pretty simple. What it means is that in our lives of faith, we start with God and God is always the one that does the saving. God is always the one who works the faith in our lives. This is in contrast to a theology of glory that says that there are certain things we need to do in order to earn God's grace and God's glory. For some faith traditions, you have to actually say when you accepted Jesus in order to feel secure in your relationship with God now and in the next Kingdom. That is not Lutheran. As Lutherans we believe that God comes down. God claims you and God works in you whether you know it or not...and God is revealed in different people at different times.

There is no cookie cutter approach.

With just that very simple explanation, let's go back to our scenario. Which way of understanding God do you want to share with the parents of a child who isn't baptized and didn't participate in religious education and doesn't go to church? As the parents are waiting there at the school, you show up to help. What is your proclamation? Do you have to ask if they gave their life to Jesus and did good works? In that theology, a person has to decide before the community admits them to heaven. That is a theology of glory. Or, do you simply say to them that our God is a God who knows suffering. Our God is a God who is with us in the most awful situations, knowing our pain and our tears. He is the suffering servant who has born our grief and carried our sorrows. Jesus is with each and every child who lays on that floor, holding them close and keeping them in love. And God knows your tears. God will be the strong for you to hold you and sustain you. The next question out of the mouth of any parent who has to watch a child suffer is this..."Why? How come our child has to go through this? Why did this bad thing happen to my wonderful and beautiful child?" And folks let me tell you, the answer to this question is where a lot of damage happens.

Theology of Glory makes sense of this bad thing In a theology of glory, you will hear things like this: "It was God's will...it happened for a reason." This statement that falls so easily from our lips is very destructive theology. It breeds guilt and shame for the survivors. For those that need comfort, it turns them against God. The one who could offer hope and strength is now tagged as the one who made this bad thing happen. The bad thing that happened is almost always a result of the human condition and sometimes we just bump into it. Blame and shame propagates the brokenness. So what does Forde offer by way of a Lutheran Lens for this scenario? God comes down in baptism and wraps us in promise and surrounds us with community to provide for a life that reflects faith. God comes down and feeds us to nourish us with life giving relationship that can be shared in the world so that others might know this promise of freedom. God gives us boundaries and rules for community living. God commands us to go into the world and gifts us with what we need for that work of faith. So, what if one doesn't grow up in a community of faith that is fashioned with the handles of faith? What do we have to say to those people? We can only proclaim what we know - God comes down and God is love. God is working among us all the time and we don't even know it, and God is a good and merciful God who chastised those who

were not merciful. God is a God of paradoxes that puts the first as the last and the last as the first. We have a God who came not to be served but to serve and although the bodily form of Jesus is not here, the presence of Jesus is with us always - working through our hands and our feet in the world – not to earn salvation and ranking in heaven but to spread the promise and the freedom of life eternal to those who might not know this good news. You see, when we are free from the fear of eternal damnation, we are free to examine those laws and embrace them willingly knowing that they provide for a healthy life in community. I don't have to adhere to the law – I get to shape and reflect a life of faith that calls me to surrender my own ego and submit to God who calls me to actions that aren't necessarily popular or powerful – because I want to! The life of faith is not meant to be bondage. The life of faith is an invitation to align and live in a way that provides more opportunity to be in relationship with God.

If it is up to us to save ourselves by our works and our right thinking, our mastery of the text or our beautiful buildings, then frankly, we don't really need Jesus, do we? In those situations, we have decided to save ourselves. The Lutheran understanding is that your salvation is secure. It is a done deal. Jesus has died on the cross and was raised three days later so by putting the responsibility on the child or the parents, that all might have life eternally. Nothing can separate us from the love of Christ. That is our proclamation. Nothing is bigger or stronger than God's promise of eternal life – even the evil one submits to the power of the living God. Yet our human condition of striving, born out of our free will, continues to propagate the insane quest of self-righteousness and glory working our way to God as if God doesn't want to bother coming to us.

> We can talk and argue and pontificate and stand on our deep theological principles, but at the end of the day, it is about relationship. How are we in relationship with God and with other people? There are some days when I have to ask myself. "Do I want to be 'right' or in relationship?" Most days I choose relationship because I honor the work that God is doing on the faith life of each person. I am not interested in being the theological police. Today, I am basking in the glow of Reformation Sunday and the passion out of which this church was born. Today is a "Here I stand!" kind of day. Today my witness and my proclamation is borrowed from the Apostle Paul and the late great theologian, Gerhard Forde: "A person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law."

The Olsburg Lutheran Church Council met on Wednesday, September 16, 2009. Co-Chairman Jim Nelson called the meeting to order. Pastor Gordy read from the Book of James and then led the group in prayer.

Members present: Kirby Burklund, Jim Nelson, Laura Clifton, Kristi Fronce and Pastor Gordy Sandquist.

Reports

<u>Secretary's Report</u>: Kristi stated that Jan Cooper's name was inadvertently left off the minutes as a member present at the August meeting. Pastor Gordy mentioned it was actually Sonja who suggested the Staff Appreciation Day. He asked that the minutes be corrected. Laura moved to approve the report with the changes. Kirby seconded. The motion carried.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Kristi moved to approve the report. Kirby seconded. The motion carried.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor Gordy read an email from Pastor Bob Shell. He is a pastor from South Dakota State University who sent an email to churches regarding the sexuality statement.
